Congrats to thesis students Mara Dempsey and Natasha Barich for completing their 2020 Honour's theses!

Mara Dempsey

The objective of Mara's thesis was to understand barriers which limit the translation of available skills into everyday life in those with schizophrenia. She conducted an archival study in order to examine potential predictors of interpersonal and adaptive competence-performance discrepancies in 875 participants diagnosed with schizophrenia and schizoaffective disorder.

Natasha Barich

Natasha's honours project explored the relationship between physical health and cognitive functioning in individuals with depression. She used both objective measures of physical fitness (handgrip) as well as subjective self-reports of how much physical activity an individual participates in weekly.

"I feel that as a young researcher there are multiple un-answered questions of what research may look like in future studies, and I believe that conducting your own study is a perfect opportunity to experience it first-hand. I am especially grateful to everyone at the CPD Lab who made the process of conducting this study an exciting journey from start to finish."
